Watch Out for Blue-Green Algae!

It's summer and warm weather conditions promote the growth of **cyanobacteria** that can make your pet seriously sick! Here's what to watch out for if your pet will be around bodies of water this season.




Dogs can become poisoned when they drink from or swim in contaminated water sources.



Cyanobacteria is most likely to thrive in bodies of water when the weather is warm (over 75 degrees) and sunny.

It is typically found in ponds and lakes, but can also be present in oceans, fresh water, damp soil, backyard fountains and even on rocks.



The bacteria itself is invisible to the eye, but water may appear pea-green in color or have a slime on surface.

If your pet is exposed to blue green algae signs may develop in as little as a few minutes or may take up to 12 hours to arise. Your pet may present with signs such as drooling, disorientation, weakness, vomiting, panting, collapse, seizures, respiratory failure and even death.

AKC DELEGATE REPORT

The quarterly meetings of the AKC Delegates were held June 12 and 13 in Newark, New Jersey. Usually the June meetings are the least well attended sessions but this year there was quite a good representation from the Member Clubs. The Committee meetings were well attended as was the Delegate's Forum and General Session.

The Parent Club Committee agenda listed 30 topics which we were able to address if not resolve. There were staff representatives from AKC who presented important information regarding their specific areas. From the Registration Department we were informed about the proposed revised format for Parent Club health statements.

Revised statements will require not only the specific test/screening recommended but the reason for it, i.e. naming the disorder or disease not the test such as "Progressive Retinal Atrophy" as opposed to "eyes" or CHIC is specified in the new format. Currently 176 Parent Clubs have submitted their health statements. These are requirements for the AKC *Breeder of Merit* and *Bred with Heart* AKC certifications. They also provide important information to prospective puppy buyers, breeders and owners.

The AKC Archivist, Jamie Fritz, outlined the services and holdings of the AKC Library. Going forward there will be digital archives available. The digital archives will allow clubs to store and share holdings. The

preferred formats for preservation purposes are AVI and MOV. She referenced the many historical holdings currently possessed by the American Kennel Club which includes all publications of the AKC Gazette from the first issue onward and all 147 of the Westminster Kennel Club catalogs.

From the Government Relations area, Sheila Goffe gave a legislative update. She cited concern regarding two specific bills at the state level. In Missouri a restrictive legislative bill was passed and is in effect. This requires special veterinary certification for a dog crossing the state line into the state. The certification must be obtained from a Veterinarian designated by the USDA and is good for 30 days. She stated that the legislation arose due to a disease outbreak that had occurred within the state. This legislation was also proposed in Pennsylvania but was not enacted due to the intervention of the AKC legislative representative in that area. She advised a HEADS UP regarding these types of legislations and the effect on dog show exhibitors.

The Economic Impact Statement of dog events to a community is being updated. This is an important document when, for example, local regulations such as venue restrictions or dog events are proposed. It states the financial gain to communities when dog events are held in the area such as to hotels, restaurants, etc.

There was extensive discussion regarding the proposal to allow all local specialty clubs the option to offer a three-point major for reserve winners when the num-

ber of dogs/bitches competing is at least twice the number required for a five-point major. This is currently available only to the National Specialty show. The motion was surprisingly defeated by the Committee. I voted in favor of the motion - that being the position of the AHCA Board. This matter now resides with the AKC Board to either endorse this motion and send on to the Delegate body for a vote - or not. More to follow to be sure.

The Committee voted unanimously to support the elimination of the mileage regulation regarding local breed specialty clubs having the ability to join with their National Specialty show. The mileage distance allowed is 500 miles. Parent Clubs using the same site year after year for their National Specialty show (e.g. the Roberts Center, Purina Farms, etc.) are restricted as to the local specialty clubs within the mileage limit and thus allowed to join the sequence and to benefit from an increased entry. This change was proposed by the AHCA Board and presented to the Committee. Again the AKC Board will determine the outcome.

The Delegate's Forum was an update on the AKC Purebred Preservation Bank - (PPB). Our own Dr. Jerry Klein was one of the speakers and he was outstanding! He cited important reasons for the establishment of this depository which could preserve breeds should catastrophic events occur such as wars, epidemics, weather disasters, genetic bottlenecks, etc. The need to preserve and protect our breeds is essential and having this sperm bank could insure the sur-

vival of purebred dogs. Particularly in breeds with small numbers, having access to this bank could increase their population numbers. For example, eleven breeds were cited in which less than 10 litters were registered last year. Dr. Charles Garvin, Chair of the PPB, expanded on the project.

It has been reported that currently there are approximately 1,000 breeding units discarded each month. A variety of reasons are responsible for this such as; failure to pay the fees, death of the breeder, the family not wishing to continue on, etc. Dr. Garvin will be the speaker at the AHCA breeders' education session at the National Specialty in October. The importance of the project cannot be overstated. We were informed that there will be no cost to breeders donating sperm for preservation to the PPB nor to the Parent Clubs participating. Following the Forum the General Session consisted of reports from the Chairman, President and CFO. AKC staff presented information regarding new registration technology for breeders and dog owners regarding the procedures and process. This was followed by the history and current status of the AKC Humane Fund.

The Delegates voted in favor of a proposed amendment which will permit "professional judges" - those who charge a fee in addition to expenses - to become Delegates. This had been prohibited and was voted down by the Delegates multiple times over the years. This time the Delegates seemed to support the concept that people should be paid for their work and judging dogs is indeed

work. Just ask a judge at the end of the day after he/she has assessed 175 dogs in heat, and/or rain and/or freezing cold/wind, - plus doing a Group or two at the end of the day which began at 8:00 AM

Please enjoy the balance of the summer months, earn many blue and purple/gold ribbons and delight in your dogs.



There is not much to report in the judge's education department. We are still working with AKC on the Canine College Breed Course for prospective judges. Additional filming was done at the Kentuckiana Cluster in Louisville this past spring, but we still haven't gotten all the media that we are happy with.

Movement footage has proven difficult in the studio-style rings. We are currently reviewing footage in the AKC TV archives, past National Specialties, and the AKC breed video that was done in the early 1990s. It may be possible to have some filming done outdoors in Orlando this December, which may prove more fruitful than the indoor filming. I am hopeful that we can have a working draft of the course by the end of this year. Creating a course with quality educational content that reflects our breed standard in a way that is detailed and effective is no small task!

We will of course be offering our classroom seminar, hands-on workshop, and ringside mentoring at the National Specialty this fall. Registration information will be included in the Premium List.

Thanks to all who got AKC to understand my request for reach-

ing out to Juniors who show our beloved Afghan Hounds. I understand from talking to Russ Hastings that AKC will be sending out invites to our National on a monthly basis until the show. I have received two responses back.

One from a young lady who has aged out of showing in Juniors last year - so we know the data base might have a fault there. I also heard from a young lady who shared that she showed a non-member's dog at a show. She would be interested in showing again but is unable to own a dog and lives out in the middle of nowhere.

So I would like to know if there is a way to communicate within our membership via an "all-call" email asking if you know or if you may know of someone willing to allow a junior (at share location) to show your dog (again sharing the date and location).

Someone from AKC did send me a survey to answer questions regarding Juniors. The individual did allude to the fact that the results of the survey would assist Junior Chairs but to date have not heard back. I am hoping this leads to a Junior Chair chatroom which was one of my request.

I have been monitoring the AKC Junior chatroom. I am concerned some of the stuff being posted is questionable. I am hoping that AKC is monitoring this more closely.

So here is my second request from AKC; would AKC send out an email to juniors asking if they would like to connect with the Junior Chairs of each national club? Personally I would like to know if they have questions, have a mentor, etc. I feel this would benefit all breeds, not just us.

I've been interested in sighthounds for most of my life. There's something so elegant and sleek about the structure of sighthounds. I started leaning towards Afghan Hounds because of the coat. The idea of getting a dog with high grooming needs appealed to me since I enjoy grooming. And then the more I learned, the more I fell in love with the breed. I want to continue learning as much as I can about native Afghan Hounds and get into coursing so Daphne can do what she was bred to do - speaking of which - she just earned her lure coursing QC certificate!

Now as to the Elite Performer title. We had to perform a routine that had a story/script and consisted of at least ten tricks with at least five involving props.

Our story is about Daphne acting out what a fictional day in Afghani-

away; cover your eyes; go hide; turn on a tap light; play the piano (minimum of four taps on one cue); unroll a rug; read index cards (sit, down, stand); identifies the flag of Afghanistan (from a group of three flags); pivot around a disc; carry a stuffed animal on her back for 15 feet;

ride in a wagon for 10 feet; and bow. I think my favorite trick was teaching her to identify the flag of Afghanistan. That one always impresses people! We only started trick training back in February of this year and I never thought we'd come this far.

On March 27th, Daphne earned her Novice trick title. I hoped that she might earn her Intermediate trick title by the end of the year, but wasn't sure if we'd make it any further than that. Yet, just three and a half months later on July 6th, Daphne became the first Afghan hound to earn the title of Elite Performer! I am so proud of how far she's come and can't wait to see what the future holds for her. 🐾


stan might look like. This includes her playing some folk music, studying the Pashto language, hunting a rabbit and riding a camel.

Five tricks of the ten had to be at the "Performer" level. The remaining five were allowed to be at the "Advanced" level but not at lower levels. The routine had to be filmed as one continuous video with no edits. Baiting with treats/toys was not permitted. We ended up performing 12 tricks so Daphne would have some room for error.

WHY TITLE A DOG?

When I first started in Afghan Hounds I was told that you only coursed your dog because it could not make it in the conformation ring...how sad. I finished my dogs in the conformation ring and attained AKC Field Championships on some.

Fast forward to 2020's (if not before) thanks to the AKC and other competition venues, there are now numerous events we can compete in with our dogs or test them for various things such as: temperament; farm dog; fit dog; canine good citizens; therapy dog and more!

With the current numbers needed to attain a championship title so many young dogs are finishing quickly. What to do with them? Have them sit home on the couch? Or perhaps you have a desire to get another dog to compete with, or even breed if you own a bitch. As we all know the Afghan Hound market is dwindling. It is much harder to place dogs into good homes and even harder if you are not a very well known person.

I did a tally from January 1, 2023 through June 30, 2023 and found a very interesting fact. There were 98 conformation titles awarded BUT in companion, performance and other events, there were 107. I am so happy to see these dogs doing so much more than looking pretty in the conformation ring. If you take your dog into agility, obedience, rally, scent work or other events both the judges and spectators are so very happy to see that an Afghan Hound is not just a pretty face but a smart, intelligent dog and willing to work.

So get involved. Check the AKC web site and see what events are offered, what you might enjoy doing, and what is offered in and around your area.

I attended an awards banquet and wanted to share what was printed in the program. I think it speaks volumes as to "why title a dog."

Not just a brag, not just a stepping stone to a higher title, not just an adjunct to competitive scores, a title is a tribute to the dog that bears it, a way to honor the dog, an ultimate memorial. It will remain in record and in memory for as long as anything in this world can remain. Few humans will do as well or better in that regard. And though the dog itself doesn't know or care that its achievements have been noted, a title says many things in the world of humans, where such things count. A title says your dog was intelligent and adaptable, and good-natured. It says that your dog loved you enough to do the things that please you, however crazy they may have sometimes seemed. And a title says that you loved your dog that you loved to spend time with it because it was a good dog that you believed in it enough to give it yet another chance when it failed, and that, in the end, your faith was justified. A title proves that your dog inspired you to that special relationship enjoyed by so few: that in a world of disposable creatures, this dog with a title was greatly loved, and loved greatly in return. And when that dear short life is over, the title remains as a memorial of the finest kind, the best you can give to a deserving friend, volumes of pride in one small set of initials after the name. A title earned is nothing less than love and respect, given and received, and permanently recorded.
